### What were seaside holidays like in the past?



#### Geography

- Know that there are seasonal and weather patterns in the world, including the UK.
- Know that a compass can be used for directions.
- Know locational and directional language, (near, far, left, right).
- Know that there are key human and physical features beyond their locality.

#### History

- Know that there are differences between the past and the present in their own and others' lives.
- Know that artefacts/sources can be matched to people of different ages.
- Know that they can show knowledge and understanding in different ways: drawing writing, talking, and role play.

#### Key Vocabulary

compare	To look at two or more things and see how they are the same and how they are different. It's like being a detective and figuring out what makes things similar, or what makes them unique.
artefact	Something that humans have made, like a tool or a piece of art. Think of it as a thing that was crafted by people, perhaps long ago, that tells us something about the past or a particular culture. It's like a story in an object!
human features	Things that you can see around you that have been built by people, e.g. bridges, roads, buildings.
physical features	Things that you can see around you that would be there even if there were no people there, e.g. mountains, rivers, oceans.
compass	A tool that helps you find your way by showing directions like north, south, east and west. It has a needle that always points north, which is one of the four main directions. Think of it like a magical pointer that always knows which way is north.
directions	Directions tell you which way to go to find your way to a place.
weather patterns	Weather patterns are like predictable weather "playlists" that happen over a longer time, like a few days or even weeks. They describe how the weather (sunny, rainy, snowy, windy) typically behaves in a certain area for a while. Think of it as the average weather you'd expect in that place, like knowing it's usually hot and dry in summer, or cold and snowy in winter.
